- 20. You know so many languages and I know you have learnt it on your own. You didn't have a formal education like many had in school. What are your recommendations to study a language? (16:24)
- 21. When you say you should learn it formally, are you saying in school or can also be outside the school? (17:12)
- 22. What languages did you learn in school? (17:36)
- 22. In your school, Portuguese, French and Germany were not available? (18:32)
- 23. You had to take Hindi? (18:40)
- 24. Your primary school was in Konkani? (18:59)
- 25. At home you spoke in Konkani or English? (19:10)
